Board approves 21st Century recommendations

In a 5-2 vote the Wayne Westland School Board approved the final recommendations from the 21st Century Schools Committee. Trustees John Goci and Carol Middel voted no. The plan includes closing six elementary schools -- Jefferson-Barns, Kettering, Lincoln, Madison, Patchin and Vandenberg. Students from Vandenberg Elementary School will now attend Taft Galloway.

In a change from the original recommendation, Hamilton Elementary will remain open and welcome some of the students from Lincoln Elementary School. The district will also reconfigure grade levels to K-4, 5-6, 7-8 and 9-12. Adams and Marshall will become 5-6 grade buildings and Franklin and Stevenson will become 7-8 grade buildings. School attendance boundaries will be redrawn to take into consideration the closing of the six elementary schools and the transfer of students.

Board Trustee Bill Gabriel urged everyone to "help and assist parents and children who have to transfer schools." He said, "I am more concerned with what we are offering in the classroom then where the classroom is."

The 5-6 buildings will still be elementary focused and there will be expanded learning opportunities that include talented and gifted classes, instrumental music and world languages. Advanced classes will also be offered at the middle schools. All day kindergarten will be offered to all incoming kindergarten students for the 2010-2011 school year.

who reside in the Wayne Memorial High School attendance area will be able to stay at Stevenson Middle School and then move on to Wayne.

Initial plans are to relocate the Family Resource Center and Oakwood Health Clinic to Adams Middle School. All of these changes will save the district about \$5 million annually. The projected operating deficit this year is \$12 million.

"This is only the beginning of the changes going to be necessary," said Jeff Rahmberg of Rahmberg and Associates. "Districts throughout the state are closing schools and reducing staff. We know change is not easy but we really don't have a choice."

The State of Michigan is in a budget crisis and school funding from the state is lacking. There is also declining student enrollment state-wide. Without the assistance of additional federal stimulus funds, it is estimated the School Aid budget from Lansing will have a deficit of \$1.2 to \$1.6 billion by 2011.

Martha Pittsenbarger said, "We're all here for the children. If the state would have given us our money we wouldn't be here making these decisions. None of us wanted to close one school but that's not the reality."

In a second resolution, the board also voted 5-2 to pass a resolution that asks the district to pursue other cost containment, cost savings and revenue producing options to help the district save an additional \$4-5 million. Among other efforts, they will meet with representatives from the district associations and employee groups to discuss cost containment.

"There's no way we can make everyone happy," said Skip Monit, Board President.

"The deficit will only get larger if we do nothing," said Rahmberg.

"This is one of many steps we will have to take in the coming months," said Cindy Schofield, Board Vice President.

After negative comments made at previous meetings some parents and administrators spoke out about the merits of their schools.

Shawn Maxwell, 21st Century School committee member and Taft parent, told the school board members, "I do have faith you will do what's in the best interest of the dis-

trict."

She said, "It takes a community to raise a child. At Taft any child will be welcomed into our school." She said each child deserves the same education regardless of where they come from.

Sandra Brock, Principal of Franklin Middle School, said "Franklin Middle School on the south side of Wayne is a very special place." There were 76 students who earned a 4.0 on their last report card. Franklin has made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for the past eight years and they have participated in the Positive Behavior System for the past four years.

"All of our kids get the same education whether they are on one side of town or the other," said Shawna Walker. Board Trustee.

"My job as principal and community member is to let everyone know what a jewel they have in Wayne Memorial," said Valerie Orr, Principal Wayne Memorial High School. She said the school has doctors, mayors and even a Tony award winning actor as alumni. They gave out \$2.2 million in scholarship money and the JROTC Raiders are rated first in the nation.

Orr urged the audience to redirect their frustration by contacting their local legislature to fight for more school funding. "Let's not tear our district apart when the problem lies outside it," she said.

The approved changes will go into effect for the 2010-2011 school year.

Then she was promoted to Secretary to the City Assessor, Finance Director and Personnel Director. She has worked for the public works department for more than 40 years. She said she really enjoys her job. "I like people. I have a great boss and I like the co-workers," she said. She also enjoys the interaction with the public.

"Patty Ditmore sets a very high standard for our department. Her attention to detail, customer service, experience and conscientiousness are unmatched. The City of Wayne and the Public Works Department in particular are very fortunate to have an employee like Patty with her vast experience and knowledge. "One of these days I'm gonna wake up and say 'I don't want to do this anymore" she jokes. But so far she enjoys coming to work everyday.

From typing on a typewriter with carbon paper to today using computers, technology has changed her job. There are no longer switchboards with multiple wires to connect calls. A few simple buttons and you can access anyone's voicemail. But those aren't the only changes in Wayne in the past 50 years.

There used to be a blacksmith right in downtown Wayne on Michigan Avenue. Designer Warehouse used to be Cunningham Drugstore where Patty worked prior to getting her job with the City.

As a student at St. Mary she remembers walking to Kresge and getting lunch.

"Wayne was a neat town," she said. "Mulholland's was a neat store. It had wood floors. It was so quaint."

She said there also used to be a convent in the middle of town. Each day the nuns would walk from the convent to St. Mary School to teach the students.

Patty graduated from St. Mary School in 1957. Her two brothers and sister also graduated from there and her two children and one grandchild attended St. Mary through eighth grade.

The family continues to have close ties to Wayne. Patty's brother, Ed Blanchard, retired from the City of Wayne this summer. He worked for the meter department. Her son, Chris, works for the Ford Assembly Plant and her daughter, Ann Marie, is a dispatcher for the Wayne Police Department.

"We are all local and that's nice," she said.

Patty has lived and worked in Wayne for 50 years. She's getting used to golden anniversaries.

"My high school graduation, marriage and job have all reached the 50 year milestone in the past couple years," she said.

Patty and her husband, Ken, married in 1959. In addition to their two children they have four grandchildren and one great grandchild. Patty's husband and both of their children graduated from Wayne Memorial High School. Patty and Ken still live in the same home on Annapolis where they raised their family.

"It's nicely located," she said. When her kids were younger they enjoyed walking to the Marshmallow Drop. "We've been doing it since it started," she said. Today her grandchildren enjoy watching the helicopter drop marshmallows from the sky.

She also has fond memories of the fishing derby the City used to host each spring in the outdoor pool at the Community Center. They would load the pool with fish and let the kids fish for a few days before cleaning the pool and getting it ready for summer swimming.

And you can't beat having a front row spot to the summer fireworks show each year. "All of Annapolis was a solid party," she said.

"The years just go by," she said.

"It's a wonderful place to live. There are great services- churches, hospitals and schools are right here and shopping is nearby," she said. "Everything we need is right here."

Master Plan complete

Both the Planning Commission and the City Council voted to adopt the proposed Downtown Master Plan. The 20 year plan is a design for redevelopment of the downtown area that covers the area from Howe Road on the east, the CSX Railroad on the west, Norfolk-Southern on the south and Sims Avenue on the north. It also includes Wayne Road from Glenwood to Harroun Parkway. The next step is the implementation process and it divided into short term and long term projects and plans.










The Kentucky Derby in Wayne?

No, not really, but almost. This is a little known fact but there used to be a horse racing track in Wayne. In the early 1900's, horse racing was quite a sport and to this day it is still popular. The Wayne Race Track was located in the flats behind Wayne Memorial High School. It is hard to find information but I did a little research to find out about the Wayne Race Track and found the following very interesting.

In 1911, on property owned by Ben Simmons a race track was built on the low land north of the river.

Ben Simmons' house and stable were on Sims Avenue in Wavne but went across the river to Glenwood then east from Fourth to the adjoining land of Orlo Proctor. The track was 1/2 mile in length and laid out by A. Tony and H. Wilmarth, Surveyor. Charlotte The track was set in a Snyder in 450 foot oval, the width was 50 feet and 1912. banked on each end. The survey of the track is shown in the article with the accompanied note from Mr. Wilmarth to Tony Snyder. The note explains the survey and also requests his payment as

There were four races a year in Wayne. The races were quite an event and the whole town came to see them. There was a grandstand built on the embankment on the north and picnic grounds behind the grandstand. Each race was for trotters and pacers and betting was prohibited but said to have occurred. During the races, a special show was given by Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Newkirk who owned and operated a saddle barn in Inkster. The Newkirk's gave shows in trick riding with a specialty of splitting paper

held by Mrs. Newkirk with a bull whip while riding. Quite impressive!!

The person most interested in getting a track located in Wayne was Tony Snyder. He owned the Stellwagen & Snyder General Store but his main love was horse racing. He pledged money for the construction and also raised and sold horses. The most successful horse was the King B. Arlington. Tony worked with the African-American horse trainer whose name was Pop Gears. Pop trained the horses and also lived at the track and was quite knowledgeable about horses and racing. Tony was said to be out at the track more than in the store during racing sea-

Racing went on at this location until 1925. The races stopped be-

cause of the popularity of the automobile and the persons invested in the track losing interest. So the next time you are sledding on the hill behind Wayne Memorial, think about horses galloping out on the track and the entire town cheering for their horse to win!!

WAYNE WESTLAND FEDERAL CREDIT UNION So Years of Excellence

In September 1952 the Kaiser Frasier Employees Credit Union in Willow Run was granted a federal Credit Union charter to serve their employees with a safe and prudent source to save and borrow. The Credit Union grew to 3,300 members with \$615,000 in total assets.

In June of 1953 an aircraft contract was canceled and the plant had soon closed its operations. The Credit Union was in trouble due to the massive layoffs. The Board of Directors knew it would only be a matter of time before the Credit Union would fail. In 1953 the Credit Union had to suspend member withdrawals and could not pay member dividends. The Credit Union's doors were closed for four months.

In March of 1954, the Board took action and submitted an amendment to change the charter of the Credit Union and become a community Credit Union. This amended charter was approved in April of 1954 and under its new charter, the name of the Credit Union was changed to Wayne Community Federal Credit Union, located at 3911 Newberry Street in Wayne, Michigan. The amended charter received attention from a round the nation to help set standards for other Credit Unions where there were similar plant closings.

In 1974, when Nankin Township became the City of Westland, the Credit Union changed its name to the Wayne Westland Federal Credit Union.

This year marks 56 years for Wayne Westland Federal Credit Union and its member-owners. Today, the Credit Union currently has over 11,000 members with an asset size of \$63 million. There was a need by the community for this Credit Union in 1954 and there is a need today in 2010.

Police chaplain offers comfort in time of need

It's the visit you hope to never get. When the police department shows up at your front door to let you know that a loved one has died they often bring a professional with them. In the City of Wayne, the professional is Pastor Andrew Gruenhagen of St. Michael Lutheran Church.

He is the department's police chaplain. He began this volunteer position last October. Offering assistance to officers during death notifications is his main duty.

"I offer spiritual and emotional support and console the family," he said. "I get to be there for the family and I am glad to do that."

He also offers support and encouragement to the police officers. It is never easy to knock on a door and deliver devastating news. They are not always the most welcome guests when they show up since most people realize why they have come.

"They know right away," he said.

"In the most dark moment of someone's lives (I try) to be able to offer a little hope."

He said he admires the job the Wayne Police Department does. "The Wayne police officers are very wonderful officers. They are very caring to the people in their community. I am impressed with their professionalism and caring," he said.

When he is not assisting the Wayne Police Department, his days are busy at pastor of St. Michael Lutheran Church on Hannan in Wayne.

"The congregation is very supportive and very proud," of his chaplain

St. Michael Church has about 300 active members. They participate in the FISH program with three other local churches to provide food to the needy. The FISH program has fed more people this year and they are grateful for the help of local Cub


"We are a very active church," Pastor Drew said.

Wayne-Westland Community Schools 21st Century Schools Initiative



Has the Board of Education adopted the recommendations of the 21st Century Committee?

Yes. On December 14, 2009, the Wayne-Westland Board of Education adopted the final proposal from the 21st Century Committee. The proposal was first presented to the Board at a Special Board Meeting on November 30, 2009. After input from the community, the proposal was modified and presented to the Board at a regularly scheduled Board Meeting on December 7, 2009. A final proposal was presented and adopted on December 14, 2009 at a Special Board Meeting.

What are the highlights of the recommendation that was adopted?

Beginning in the 2010-2011 school year: • Change to a K-4; 5-6; 7-8 and 9-12 grade configuration. • Offer All Day Kindergarten in every elementary building in the district. • 5-6 grade buildings will be elementary focused with Instrumental Music classes, World Language classes, and Gifted/Talented programs. • 7-8 middle schools will offer expanded World Language classes and advanced classes. • Utilize eleven elementary buildings, two 5-6 buildings, two 7-8 buildings, and our current two high schools. • Draw new attendance boundaries for eleven K-4 buildings. The attendance boundaries for the 5-6 and 7-8 buildings will be aligned with the current high school boundaries. There will be no attendance boundary changes for the high schools. • The Board of Education must pursue additional cost saving measures.

Which elementary buildings are proposed to stay open for the K-4 programs?

Edison, Elliott, Graham, Hamilton, Hicks, Hoover, Roosevelt-McGrath, Schweitzer, Taft-Galloway, Walker-Winter and Wildwood.

Which current middle schools are proposed to become 5-6 upper elementary buildings?

Marshall will become a 5-6 upper elementary building in the John Glenn attendance area. Adams will become a 5-6 upper elementary building in the Wayne Memorial attendance area.

Which middle schools are proposed to become 7-8 middle school buildings?

Stevenson will become a 7-8 middle school building in the John Glenn attendance area. Franklin will become a 7-8 middle school building in the Wayne Memorial attendance area.

Are any "grandfathering" rules being recommended?

6th and 7th graders currently attending Stevenson Middle School who reside in the Wayne Memorial attendance area will be given the option to remain at Stevenson through the 8th grade before attending Wayne Memorial.

What are the advantages of a 5-6 grade level configuration?

After visiting several districts in the area that run a 5-6 educational program, the committee felt this configuration offered several advantages:

• The ability to offer programs in instrumental music, foreign language, and gifted/talented to students in these upper elementary grades. • The opportunity to house 5th & 6th graders in a developmentally appropriate setting. Sixth graders remain in an elementary setting, thus their transition to middle school is delayed until they reach 7th grade. • Upon leaving 4th grade, 5th & 6th graders are introduced to the classmates they will remain with through high school, thus making the transition to middle school and high school much easier. • Provides more academic collaboration and targeted professional development opportunities for staff.

How much money will be saved by closing six buildings? Will this be enough?

The district anticipated that \$5 million will be saved annually by closing the six elementary buildings. The 21st Century Committee has asked the Board to pursue cost containment, cost savings and revenue producing options of another \$5 million beginning next year. Due to decreased state funding, increased costs, and declining enrollment, the District is facing an annual operating deficit in excess of \$7 million this school year, with an operating deficit in future years that will likely only increase.

Will transportation guidelines change?

No. The district will continue to make bussing available to elementary students (K-4 and 5-6) who live more than a mile from their school. Secondary students (7-8 and 9-12) will continue to be bussed if they live more than 1 1/2 miles from their school. Individual students may experience changes in schools and bussing routes depending on the final recommendation of the 21st Century Schools Committee and the action taken by the Board of Education.

Will All Day Kindergarten be available in the K-4 buildings?

Yes. All Day Kindergarten will be in all buildings for the Fall of 2010. Future state funding may impact the number of all day kindergarten class-rooms offered district wide.

Where can I get more information on the changes adopted by the Board of Education?

The final recommendation along with district maps and all minutes from committee and team meetings are posted on the school district website **wwcsd.net**. Just click on the 21st Century Schools logo on the homepage.



Winter storm safety

Most of us who live in Michigan are capable of getting through winters with few problems other than the typical winter inconvenience of cold weather and shoveling snow off cars and driveways. Even then we wait to get the snow blower or shovel out until it's too late and the snow has piled up. Let's take a look at some winter hazard safety tips so we can be prepared now and not when it's too late.

First, you should have an Emergency Preparedness kit stocked with three days' supply of non perishable food and water. Have one gallon of water per person per day, flash lights and spare batteries. Go to www.ready.gov for information on building a preparedness kit.

If you lose power and have no heat, the best thing to do is bundle up with clothes and blankets and ride it out. Many people make the deadly mistake of trying to use alternative heat sources to heat their homes when the power goes out. The use of kerosene heaters in a home is against the City of Wayne ordinance. Kerosene heaters and kitchen ovens should never be used to heat the home. They give off high levels of deadly carbon monoxide, plus the radiant heat given off from them may cause nearby combustibles to ignite.

Generators should be placed outside, and never back feed into a circuit breaker box. Back feeding is a fire hazard and a danger to power crews working to restore power in vour area.

If you lose power in your home due to a storm you probably are not alone. Look to see if your neighbors are also out of power, if so there is no reason to call 911, trust me we will | at 734-722-1111.



know. Call 911 if you see a downed power line or a power line sparking or arcing, or have an odor of natural gas in your home.

Please do not call 911, the police or fire station to ask when your power will be restored. We have no more information than the general public. Call your power company for information on when your utilities will be restored.

Occasionally during a winter storm we may lose our cable or satellite TV. Now that there is no longer analog television (free TV), you will be left in the dark with no information on storm warnings or school closings. It is recommended that you buy a digital converter box to have on hand so you will be able to switch over in the absence of your normal TV feed.

Tune into AM Radio 1620 for City of Wayne information for information on all types of emergencies affecting our City. WJR news radio AM 760 is the official news and weather channel to keep up to date on any emergency information. The City of Wayne website has a link to NOAA (The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) for weather informa-
