

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Age is just a number

Statistics show that the United States is getting older, in terms of the number of citizens entering their senior years. Wayne County Senior Services Director Kevin Kelley says the Senior Olympics provide participants with "physical and mental exercises," and include everything from golf to euchre to track events.

I had the opportunity to witness this first hand, and I can tell you that this activity will be very well-received!

I encourage seniors to form and join a Wii bowling league in Wayne. Bowling from the comfort of a sofa or chair? Modern technology makes it possible.

Taking care of our seniors and keeping them active mentally as well as physically is an investment that brings bountiful returns.

Zoarob said business had been steady since they opened with the morning being their busiest time of the day. The Tim Hortons' drive thru Road in Westland.


is one of the most popular places in town everyday from 7-7:30 a.m.

1960's in Wayne

The City is now 50 years old. In order to keep with the theme of our golden anniversary, I thought it would be interesting to, each month, do a "headline highlights" of the news worthy happenings in the City. At the Historical Musuem, there are many yearbooks with articles about "City" happenings. They are great fun to go through. This will be a brief snapshot of the many items going on in town.

A lot of development was happening. January 20, 1965 - a ground breaking was held for the new Wayne Bowl. There would be a 40 lane alley in 36,000 sq. ft. with a cocktail lounge, dining room and banquet rooms for 150 people. May 23, 1965 - Westwick Cooperative Town House gets approved. It was to contain 366 units, a community center and office. January 6, 1966 - the Glenwood Road Senior Housing apartments began. There eventually would be 66 units in the award winning design apartments. The architects for the project were Meathe, Kessier and Associates of Grosse Pointe. January 17, 1968 - a ground breaking was held for the Big Boy Restaurant at 33290 Michigan Avenue. The building was to contain two floors and 9,000 sq. ft. The project also had a covered drive-in with car service in the rear. November 22, 1967 - a ribbon cutting was held at the new Lent's Funeral Home. "One of the finest buildings built in the new downtown." January 17, 1968 - stated a ground breaking was held for the new doctor's office at Second Street and Michigan Avenue West. Dr. Gignac and Dr. Kominars built the building and it would house



their offices.

By the mid 1960's the main theme is that of Urban Renewal. Every week the Eagle, Dispatch and even the Detroit New and Free Press had articles giving the most current information to the public. May 25, 1966 - "Urban development planning continues." The article gave an update of the transportation plan, which recommended a boulevard for Wayne Road. This was ruled out of the plan by the City Council. What were they thinking?? It also stated that Ford Motor Company was scouting the area on the west side of town for a Ford dealership. The early beginnings of the Jack Demmer location. Through out the 1960's so many changes were happening in downtown that it boggles the mind. One article from August 3, 1966 titled "66 more on list - raze 150 buildings in Downtown area" that brought the total to 216 buildings demolished. A real shame. What I am glad about is that many of the articles listed people who went before the City Council and objected to the plans. One article is titled "Wayne Citizens Speak on Downtown - heap criticisms on City leaders" and it had people lined up to speak at the City Council. At least they didn't take it lying down.

One of the biggest upsets to the

town was that Chum's Donuts was going to close because the Urban Renewal Department bought the property. After a petition from 500 long standing customers titled "You Can't Stop Making Donuts" The Stockwells decided to open at their new location on Glenwood across from Wayne High.

Here is something to take your mind off our hot weather; in February 1965 a huge snow storm happened in town and all of southeast Michigan. The storm had a lot of snow and 50 mph winds creating eight foot high drifts. Operation "dig out" took two days, most of the businesses and schools were closed. 300 cars were abandoned on the City streets. Even the DPW had trouble getting through, one of the plow trucks got stuck and had to be pulled out.

In December 1968, the Wayne Dispatch wrote that Wayne Centen-

nial Committee selected the new City Seal and Motto. Sharon Steinhauer scribed the motto "People Pride & Progress" and Charles Guernsey designed the seal. There were more than 200 entries and their combined efforts are still used today. Now that is leaving your mark!!


This short article barely touches the surface. If you want to read more stop at the Historical Museum and look through the yearbooks - it is a lot of fun.

This program is considered one of the most comprehensive of its kind by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. Having all of the items included in the kit can be helpful for police if the dreaded time comes to search for a missing child.

ORDINANCE NO. 2010-09

AN ABSTRACT OF AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF WAYNE THE CITY OF WAYNE ORDAINS:

Section 1. THAT THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF WAYNE BE AMENDED BY THE ADDITION TO PART TWELVE, PLANNING & ZONING, CHAPTER 1283, RENEWABLE SOLAR ENERGY

Property owners are attempting to offset the increasing cost of electricity and heat supplied by fossil-fuels with the use of alternative forms of energy. Due to the close proximity of buildings within a city, it is necessary to permit certain types of alternative energy devices to be placed on properties and to have restrictions on these devices for safety and security purposes. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide consistent regulations for alternative energy devices to protect the general health, safety and welfare; to insure that the city's property values, appearance, and character are preserved and respected; and to minimize potential off-site impacts from permitted devices and uses.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall become effective ten days after enactment and upon publication thereof.

In a continued celebration of the City of Wayne's 50th anniversary the Wayne Dispatch will continue to highlight some of the businesses who are at least 50 years old too.

Many people remember Kerwin Vision and Dr. Pat Kerwin. He bought the eye practice in 1969 from Harvey Firestone who began an eve practice in Wayne in 1946. At the time it was located in a house. In 1969 Kerwin Vision moved to a building on Second Street and Westbound Michigan Avenue. In 1984 Dr. Michael Warmuskerken joined the practice and worked with Dr. Kerwin. "Dr. Kerwin is a colorful person," he said. Warmuskerken said Dr. Kerwin splits his time between Florida and Michigan. He comes into the office about once a year to get his prescription checked.


In 1991 Warmuskerken purchased the practice but continued with the name Kerwin Vision until they made the move to their current location in 2001.

"When we made the move, we changed the name," Warmuskerken said. Today In Focus Eyecare is located on Wayne Road just south of Michigan Avenue.

Warmuskerken said he sees about 1500- 2000 patients a year but "we're always looking for new patients." In Focus is a primary care optometry office and offers eye health exams for glaucoma, cataracts, macular degeneration, diabetic eye exams and visual therapy in addition to glasses and contact prescription exams. They see patients from children through senior citizens.

The perks of going to a private practice is the personal service and continuity of care you will get. Warmuskerken said. You will see the same doctor, who spends quality time with patients, every time you visit In Focus. They offer quality materials at affordable prices. City mourns former leader

Honesty and integrity is how former Wayne City Manager Patrick J. Cullen will be remembered. Cullen, 84, passed away on July 20, 2010. He was born on April 28, 1926. He is survived by his wife, Joyce, his children, Timothy, Thomas, Michael, Susan, Anne and Bridget, 14 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Cullen was a lifelong Wayne resident. He attended St. Mary's Catholic School and graduated from Wayne Memorial High School. He was in the Navy after high school and attended University of Detroit, Eastern Michigan and Wayne State University.

He began his career with the City of Wayne in June 1949 as a meter reader. He also served as supervisor to the water department, city clerk and assistant city manager before being promoted to city manager in July 1973. He retired in July 1981.

Ray Locorno first met Pat Cullen in the mid 1950s when he applied for the position of police officer and Cullen was personnel director. In 1973 Locorno was a lieutenant with the police department when Cullen became city manager and asked him to be the assistant city manager and personnel director.

"I felt honored and privileged to work for and with Pat Cullen. He was one of the best bosses I worked for," Locorno said. Cullen's management decisions were based on using the taxpayers' dollars wisely, he said. "I can't emphasize his honesty and credibility. I enjoyed going to work every day and working with Mr. Cullen," Locorno said.

In 1975 Cullen asked Locorno to become the director of public safety. Cullen then appointed Tom Daly as the assistant city manager.

"Pat was a good manager and was a mentor. Probably everything I learned about city government I learned it from Pat. He was very professional," said Tom Daly.

"He was very good at what he did. He thought things out fully before he made a decision. We got along real good together," Daly said.

Daly said the parking garage was just being completed as was the Wayne Road bridge over Rouge River when Cullen and Daly served the city together.

"Ford Motor always had some kind of development," he said.

Daly said in addition to Cullen being involved in the city's development, he was also involved in the community. He belonged to St. Mary Catholic Church, Kiwanis and Jaycees.

Pat Cullen hired current City Manager John Zech in 1979. "He brought me over from Plymouth," Zech said.

"I have met a lot of city managers in my life. The thing about Pat Cullen is here is a guy who started at the bottom and in 24 years he rose through the ranks to city manager," Zech said. "His heart and soul was in the City of Wayne," said Daly.



> Amendments to this ordinance are in regards to temporary daily entertainment permits, which are limited to monologues and dialogues performed by fully clothed entertainers.

Section 2. That this Ordinance shall be published as required by law.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall become effective ten days after enactment and upon publication thereof.
