# Legacy



In order to set the record, 1027 people would have to complete the walk using Finnish walking sticks. (They resemble cross-country skiing poles, only with a rubber bottom) We only got 800 people to participate, so the world record still belongs to the Swedes.

Cataracts are the leading cause of blindness in people 55 and older, but did you know they could also contribute to an increased risk for cognitive decline and dementia?

In a study of 625 elderly patients conducted by the University of Michigan, those with poor vision who did not receive proper eye care were 9 times more at risk of developing Alzheimer's disease and 5 times more at risk for some form of

cognitive impairment. In contrast, those participants with good vision had a 63% reduced risk of developing dementia.



#### St. John's Lutheran School celebrates 100th anniversary

It was Sept. 1913 when St. John's Parochial School was founded. They began with 27 students and increased to 35 by the end of the school year. The first classes were held in the church.

On Oct. 21, 1917 the first school building was dedicated on Elizabeth Street in Wayne. Pastor Oscar J. Peters was the one-room school's first and only teacher for 14 years. By the congregation's 75th anniversary in 1951, a new school was dedicated on South Wayne Road in Westland, the current location.

The new building had three classrooms, a kindergarten room, an office and library.

In 1965 the church moved from their location on Elizabeth to Glenwood, next to the school. In 1966 a parish hall/gymnasium, new library, kitchen and new school entrance was added to the school. In 1976 five new classrooms were built. Today St. John's Lutheran School serves students in K-8 grades.

# Two caught in Leo's Jewelry robbery

Wayne police have caught two of the suspects in connection with the July 17 robbery at Leo's Jewelry on Michigan Avenue. Four subjects approached the store just after 1 p.m. Three entered the store, damaged display cases, stole property and fled on foot.

# City to use new blight enforcement procedure

It was a different walking tour of downtown. Instead of looking at DIA art pieces or walking along the riverfront, this was a tour of blight in the downtown area.

Councilman John Rhaesa and Assistant Fire Chief John Adams pointed out the tall grass, weeds, garbage, piles of debris, broken windows or doors, unkempt buildings with peeling paint, overgrowth of grass and illegal dumping. "This is an embarassment to our city. The condition of some of the areas of downtown are unacceptable, this needs to be addressed immediately," said Councilman John Rhaesa.

But this is not a problem without a solution. This year a new blight ordinance program was adopted in Wayne. Approved by city council this new ordinance is very similar to the program being used in Westland. The ordinance departments in Wayne and Westland now run out of the Fire Marshall's office of the Wayne-Westland Fire Department.

There is an easy way to report the blight noticed in Wayne. From the city's website cityofwayne.com, residents or business owners can click on the ordinance helpdesk to report tall grass and weeds or other blight and ordinance issues. One the problem is reported it is time stamped and complainants will receive a confirmation e-mail.

This program is available seven days a week.

(Editor's note: A concern was reported after 5 p.m. on a Friday evening. Within 10 minutes a confirmation email was sent with a few follow up questions. Within one week the issue was remedied.)

The Ordinance Enforcement Team recently did a sweep of the city to identify blight and ordinance issues. They are working with city officials, residents and business owners to build clean safe neighborhoods by providing education and enforcement.

The new ordinance "allows us to get in and make changes," Adams

# Wayne-Westland gains 65 students from Inkster dissolution

Wayne-Westland Schools are not merging with or taking over Inkster Public Schools. As a result of the dissolution of the Inkster Public Schools, Wayne-Westland will gain the northwest quadrant of the former Inkster School District. This area includes a small portion of Westland and Inkster.

The new Wayne-Westland Community Schools boundaries will now include the area between Avondale and Michigan Avenue from Henry Ruff on the west to Middlebelt on the east.

In total Wayne-Westland will receive 65 students from Inkster Schools. There are 34 (K-5), 13 (6-8) and 18 (9-11) students who will attend David Hicks Elementary, Adams Upper Elementary, Franklin Middle School or Wayne Memorial High School.


"We are going to welcome them with open arms," said Greg Baracy, superintendent, Wayne-Westland Schools. Romulus Schools will receive about 380 students, Taylor Schools 376 and Westwood Schools 133 students. There are about 900

Inkster students who came from Detroit Public Schools who will have to return to Detroit Public Schools.

An inventory of assets is being done in Inkster and will be divided up to the four districts. Wayne-Westland will also receive the one school that is located in their new quadrant, Blanchette Middle School, which will not be used by Wayne-Westland.

The receiving school districts are not taking staff, just the students and some of the inventory.

The dissolution of Inkster Public Schools is a result of a bill passed earlier this year for school districts with up to 2400 students. On July 18, 2013, State Treasurer Andy Dillon and State Superintendent Michael Flanagan determined that both Buena Vista and Inkster Public School Districts met all of the criteria required under Public Act 96 of 2013 that would require them to be dissolved. On July 23, 2013, they formally declared that both districts would be legally dissolved. Inkster Public Schools was dissolved due to its inability to obtain private financ-



#### Four cities celebrate joint emergency Dispatch center

Westland Mayor William R. Wild welcomed city officials from Wayne, Garden City and Inkster to the newly operational Joint Emergency Dispatch Center.

Our municipalities must run leaner and be more efficient," Wild said. The focus of the consolidation was to do "the smart thing and the right thing."

Located in the Westland Police Station, the center fields 911 emergency calls for each of the four cities.

The center went live on June 30 with the official inauguration with city officials on July 29.

Inkster Mayor Hilliard Hampton said," Collaborative partnerships are where we are going in municipalities. Our resources are dwindling."

This newest shared service venture will serve a combined population of 154,748 and will handle about 140,000 calls to service per year.

"In these tough times, creating efficiencies and combining resources are the way of the future and will allow cities to maintain essential services even when faced with shrinking budgets," he said.

They met the goal of reducing response time to residents while also saving the municipalities a combined \$380,000.

The project received a \$600,000 federal grant from Homeland Security to replace the dispatch counsels.

Wild said he hopes other communities look to the new combined

emergency dispatch center as a pilot program and blueprint for other municipalities.

Wayne Mayor Al Haidous said, "The 'do more for less' philosophy has been working. It will save jobs, enhance services and save tax dollars."

Garden City Mayor Randy Walker said, "This is a great day for all four communities. This is the first phase of more consolidations to come."

#### **Facts about Kelly** Miller Bros. Circus

The circus travels about 10.000 miles every year and performs in over 200 cities in North America from March to October.

The circus travels with over 70 staff and two-dozen animals. The seating capacity of the tent is 1100.

The tent is 120' by 120' and is 40' high and is supported by more than a quarter of a mile of heavy gauge aluminum tubing as well as several miles of rope, steel cable and chain.

Kelly Miller Bros. Circus employs 11 people to take care of all of the circus animals.

The animals receive a veterinary exam every 30 days.



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# Reinvest in Wayne

The Winchester Consulting Group (WCG) wants to help residents, business owners and other stakeholders Reinvest in Wayne. Hired in March, they provide grant writing, lobbying and consulting services to the city.

WCG was able to secure a sixmonth \$135,000 extension to the SAFER Grant for the Wayne-Westland Fire Department.

They have applied for several grants to help the city provide services for residents including the Competitive Grant Assistance Program, which is a recycling program and was written in collaboration with Garden City. If awarded, this would provide over \$1 million for curbside recycling carts.

The city's website will also get help from WCG.

"We need to get Wayne an online presence. We are in the process of redesigning the website with a page for press releases and a Facebook page," said Lisa Nocerini, WCG vice president.

WCG is working with city departments, Ford Motor Company and DTE energy to increase the energy efficiency of city buildings and streetlights and reduce the cost of the electric bill. Currently the city pays \$1 million to DTE.

Another idea suggested by WCG is a business incubator to attract start up businesses.

"It's a way to grow Wayne," Nocerini said.

The city could work with Michigan State University who would provide free assistance to help get the

program started. The city would provide a building that could be used to house several small businesses under one roof. They would share utilities, technology and support services until their businesses grew large enough to move into a larger space.

Nocerini said there are a lot of good ideas but it's all a hodgepodge.

Reinvest in Wayne is a way to get the community engaged, bring talent to the table and focus on improving housing, business retention, economic development and parks and recreation.

"We have a lot of opportunity here," she said.

Councilman Skip Monit said, "I don't think any of us realized the true ability. This city needs a direction. We stumble around and don't have that direction and what you are saying to me tonight is 'here's the direction'. I like everything I've heard."

They are able to help provide research and information for the voters on the 7 mills that will be on the November ballot. If approved, it will provide funding for 10 years for a 345 program for a police and fire retirement fund.





# Summer fun

If you think about your childhood you remember the thrill of the last days of school and the excitement and expectation of many long days of play with your siblings, friends and neighbors. There were picnics along the Rouge River or Carpenter Lake on Hannan Rd. You could sit in the Public Square on summer evenings and hear a band concert. A trip to Bob-Lo was a special treat in the summer or a family reunion with relatives coming from far and near to re-connect. A horse and buggy ride on a summer afternoon was enjoyed as well as a nap in a hammock. Also, everyone looked forward to the circus coming to town in the summer. What a great time that was. Long, lazy summer days were special. Of course there were the chores to do on the farms and children were expected to help before running off for a swim in the Rouge or to play with neighbor children.

Another favorite summer pastime of the people of Wayne were the horse races at the race track in Wayne. In 1911, several area business men put up the money to build




a horse race track in Wayne. It was built on part of the property owned by Ben Simmons who operated a riding stable on Sims Street. His property ran from Sims to Glenwood and the track was constructed on the property north of the Rouge in the area of the "flats" south of Wayne Memorial High School where the original football field was located in 1953. The track was an oval ½ mile 450 foot wide dirt track and was in operation until 1925. In the summers of the 1920's a rodeo would be held at the track on the Ash Street side. The caretaker of the track was Mose Duphel. He lived in a small house on the high ground next to Glenwood Cemetery. His duties were to take care of the track and the horses as well as do some farming. The old band stand was moved from the Public Square to the track to be used as a shelter. The grand stand was located on the side of the hill on the north end of the track. When there were no races, the track was used for training and working out the horses. Betting on the races was illegal but it did take place.

# **Council approves language for November ballot**

Voters in Wayne will be asked to approve up to a 7- mill charter amendment for 10 years that would provide funding to establish a police and fire retirement system under Public Act 345.

In a 5-2 vote city council approved putting the amendment on the November ballot. Councilmen Jim Hawley and John Rhaesa voted no.

If approved, beginning with the 2014-15 fiscal year, police officers and firefighters will become members of a separate retirement system and contributions will be transferred

to the Public Act 345 system. The 7 mills would raise about \$1.98 million.

City officials have said this would help the city's budget problems by taking the retirement cost of the police and fire departments out of the general fund. Otherwise the city will have to cut up to \$2 million out of the budget.

Council initially discussed asking voters to levy 5 mills for five years but that motion failed.

Councilman Jim Hawley said, "I am having problems with this process and asking people for this added cost."

He said creating a Fire Authority requires a vote of the people and "I think that is more important and I don't think you can pass both of them. I'm wrestling with whether I would support this resolution or not."

It is expected that the creation of the fire authority will be on the ballot in Nov. 2014.


Councilman Albert Damitio said, "I don't want to confuse what is going to happen with the Wayne Westland fire department. 345 is separate from this issue. I think we really need to have this pass by the citizens."

He said, "Otherwise we are looking at a critical situation."

Councilman John Rhaesa said he is concerned about taxes getting higher for residents and people choosing not to move to Wayne.
