

# **Wayne Main Street hosts Building Basics Workshop**

The Wayne Main Street Design Committee announces the upcoming application period of the Wayne Main Street Design Services program. An information meeting for business and building owners who are located in the Main Street district will be held on Monday, April 13th, 5:30 p.m. at the Wayne Fire Station. Wayne Main Street's Executive Director, Lindsey Wooten, will present information about the Design Services program and show the "Building Basics" webinar by the Michigan Main Street Center.

The program is one of the services offered to Wayne Main Street as a Michigan Main Street Select Level community.

In the first five years of the program, Wayne Main Street will receive design training and consultation services by the State Historic Preservation Office to help maintain and enhance downtown Wayne's historic integrity. Individualized design assistance for façade improvements of downtown buildings is part of the



Main Street Design Services. Wayne Main Street will award up to three services per year for five years, with a maximum of 15 services. Services include a site visit by the Michigan Main Street Design Specialist, meeting with the property owner, schematic drawings detailing the proposed façade improvements, paint samples, example photographs, and additional information needed to complete the work. Each service is valued at \$2000-3000 each.

The application deadline for Design Services is May 22, 2015. To be eligible for this service, the property owner/business owner must attend the Building Basics Workshop. The



Workshop will educate attendees on the Main Street program and its Four Point Approach® to downtown revitalization. This will be the only time this webinar will be presented this year. Information will also be given on how to apply for design services and what must be included with the application. US 12 Bar and Grill, Dairy Queen and one other property on Wayne Rd were awarded design services last year.

# Wayne Memorial Bowling team wins State Championship

The Wayne Memorial High School boys bowling team finished with a first place win at the state championship on March 6 and 7, being the first boys' bowling team to win states in the history of Wayne Memorial.

Coach Bob Jawor (whom the players call "Jaws") said that the team played strong from the very start of the day, and continued to try and improve, even as the competition was taking place.

Jawor has been the coach for the team since the program started nine years ago, and has only seen one other high finish, in 2009, when the team placed second.

"I couldn't be prouder of my team," Jawor said. "I wasn't really surprised when they won. They all bowled so well."

The boys were thought to be underdogs by many of the teams who participated in the event, including local rival Canton, who Wayne beat early on in the competition, even though Canton had beat Wayne in every tournament leading up to the championship.

"It started out as a really good day. Our first game was really strong. I shot a 288, and all the other guys did incredible, too," senior Brandon June said.

The team beat out Saginaw Heritage, a high school known to do well in bowling, 1,281 to 1,228, in the division one final on Friday.

"I knew we had it in us," June said. "I could see it. Our mindsets were just to get in there and bowl, and that's exactly what we did."

Many questioned how the team was going to pull out the first place win with the rocky start of the actual season, not having as good a record as they'd had in the past, but the boys went into the competition with an abundance of confidence.

"We all had moments of greatness," June said. "So many people had fantastic scores throughout the day, especially Conner (who scored a 231 on the last game)."

The members who took part in the championship match were Ty

Weber '17, John Willet '16, Conner Weber '16, Jarret O'Chel '15, and Brandon June '15, who said the boys often say "live and die with the five," referring to how they bowl together.

The team members got warm welcomes when arriving back to school, some even getting applause as they went into classrooms.

Willet was applauded when walking into his first hour on Monday

morning, and he could not be more satisfied with the way he and his team were able to bring pride to the school.

"It's something you can't forget. It can't be taken away from you. I did it for the seniors and all my other teammates as well," Willet said.

"When I realized the boys actually did it, it was such a great feeling," Jawor said. "All their hard work paid off, and they really did earn and deserve that win."

Though Jawor was very proud of his team, no one was prouder than the bowlers themselves. "It was so unreal," June said. "Since it's my last year, it meant so much to me that we'd won. It was our goal since the very start of the season, and it was such an amazing feeling to be able to experience it with my team."

Coach Jawor said his favorite part about the experience was seeing how happy the guys were when they were given their medals and trophy. "They were so excited. When I knew it was over and that they'd won, it was such a fantastic feeling."

Though the winning was great, it wasn't June's favorite part.

"I just loved spending time with my team," June said. "I wouldn't change a thing about that day."




### **City Council election**

Wayne residents who are interested in running for City Council in the November election have until 4 p.m. on April 21 to submit their paperwork. Nominating petitions are available at the City Clerk's office at the temporary site of City Hall, Vandenberg School, 32101 Stellwagen. Petitions must be submitted with a minimum of 25 but no more than 50 signatures of persons registered to vote in the City of Wayne. Also, candidates may not be in monetary arrears to the city.

### **May Ballot**

Voters will have three issues on the May 5 ballot. They are:

**State Proposal 15-1**, is a proposal to amend the State Constitution to increase the sales tax from 6% to 7%. The funds generated from this increased tax would go to the School Aid Fund and local governments. It would also provide addi-

tional money for roads.

The City of Wayne will also have two proposals on the ballot.

**Proposal No. 1** will ask voters to amend the city charter so that police officers and firefighters are excluded

from the retirement system effective July 1, 2015. If approved, they would become members of a separate retirement system under PA 345. The accumulated contributions to the current employee's retirement system made by or on behalf of police officers and firefighters would be transferred to the Act 345.

Proposal No. 1 is will ask voters to approve up to 3 mills (\$3 per \$1,000 of the taxable value of all property in the city) for five years. If approved, it will generate \$1,068,000 per year.

**Proposal No. 2** will ask voters to adopt an Act 345 retirement system for police officers and firefighters. If approved, there will be a board of trustees to manage and operate the system. These funds would be separate from the city's general fund.

### Fire Dept. seeks SAFER Grant

Wayne-Westland Fire Chief Michael Reddy updated city council on the possibility to add more firefighters to the city.

"We applied for a SAFER (Staffing

for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response) grant again for six firefighters," he said. If the grant is approved the six firefighters for Wayne would be fully funded by the federal government with no cost to the city.

Westland has also applied for 13 firefighters. If both grants were approved, this would bring the Wayne-Westland Fire Department staff to 90 firefighters.

"Wayne has a better chance because of its financial situation," Reddy said. "Wayne has a better shot but we applied in both cities."

If Wayne receives the grant and Westland doesn't the firefighters will still go to the Wayne Fire Station.

The grant will provide for the firefighters for two years. They city does not have to commit to keeping them after if they cannot afford it.

"They get hired for two years and then can be laid off. We don't need to keep them on for an additional two years," Reddy said.

The grant has been submitted and is moving forward to the review process. The grants will be awarded in July and cities will immediately receive the funds and can start the hiring process.

Wayne currently has 12 firefighters and is incurring daily overtime costs. The grant would provide \$1.2 million for the firefighters and reduce the overtime costs.

# **Crosspointe Church** ministry addition

CrossPointe Community Church is planning a 5,000 sq. ft. addition to their building. The new addition will be used for a Children's Ministry Center.

Pastor Phil DiLernia said they would be able to offer more services to the community and the youth. CrossPointe currently has about 350 members.





# In memory of my daughter, Isabella Harmony Shuh

(9/30/2005-3/08/2006)

At about 8 a.m. on March 8th of 2006, my phone rang. It was Children's Hospital in Detroit. They told me that it was time, and that I probably needed to hurry. You see, they knew that my wife and I wanted to be present when our five month old daughter passed away.

We made it in time. When we entered the NICU, it was the first time we had seen our daughter free of tubes and wires in months. My wife sat in the rocking chair and held her. I hugged them both. And we said goodbye to our daughter.

Later that day, the pain was compounded. As I sat across from the funeral director, I cannot tell you how horrible I felt as he told me how much money I needed for my daughter's funeral. (I want to interject here that they were definitely not going to make any money. They were being exceptionally kind. But these things do cost money) I did not have any money at that time. That moment almost crushed me.

Then the most amazing thing happened! Family, friends, and church members called each other and started taking up a collection! Within two days, we had all the funds we needed to pay for the funeral. It was overwhelming, and I vowed that if I ever had the chance, I would help those in a similar situation.

That chance came. When I was on the show Biggest Loser, I shared about my daughter. It was part of my weight gain story, because I gained 100 pounds after my daughter's death. In the episode where I talked about my daughter, a woman named Sarah Slack was watching in the state of Washington.

Sarah's story is similar to mine. She lost her son, and needed help to bury him. She started a non-profit called the TEARS Foundation. This organization raises money to pay for infant funerals when people cannot afford them. (Most young families that lose a baby are saving for a crib, not a casket)

Sarah was able to find me through a mutual acquaintance, and



we began talking about starting a Michigan chapter of TEARS. Two years ago, my wife and I officially launched this state-wide chapter!

This year, we have INCREDIBLE NEWS. The state of Michigan has been selected to be the fourth state to receive the Angel of Hope Monument. Three pieces of granite that cost \$30,000 have been donated to help people honor their children that they have lost.


The middle part of the monument has an angel carved into it, as well as the Angel of Hope poem, written by a bereaved mom specifically for this monument. The two side pieces are carved into butterfly wings, and people can have their baby's name etched into them.

There is a cost involved if you or someone you know wants to have a baby's name added to the monument.

You can pay a one-time fee of \$250 or you can sign up to have \$20 automatically withdrawn from your account for a minimum of a year. # **Sweet treats for Wayne**

As March arrives and winter wanes we begin to look for signs of spring and an end to the cold snowy weather of January and February. Of course the 20th of March is the official first day of spring but there are other signs we look for. Robins gathering in our yards, windy days blowing kites across the sky, snow piles melting, crocus and forsythia blooming, buds on bushes and trees. These are all signs that spring is on the way. But, the most important and visible sign of spring is the opening of the Dairy Queen on Wayne Road on March 1st. That's the beginning of the spring season in Wayne!

Our Dairy Queen has been in Wayne for 66 years. In 1948, Dale and Eileen Rockwell bought a piece of land on the corner of Wayne Road and Chestnut Street from a Mr. Moses Dupont. The Rockwells had the Dairy Queen building built and it opened for business in 1949. It was one of the first Dairy Queens in Michigan. Mr. Rockwell built the Dairy Queen sign that sat on top of the building. Their daughter Gayle attended Wayne Memorial and worked making cones at the family owned business while she was a teen. Their son Delvyn helped by transporting the supplies for making the ice cream from the family home where they were kept to the Dairy Queen. He also waited on customers. His wife Kathie, who lives in Wayne today, remembers being out on a date with Delvyn and having to go by the business so that he could help clean the ice cream machines, the counters and floors and lock up the building for the day. (Wayne's own" Wild" Bill Copeland, a longtime



business man in Wayne, got his first job at the Dairy Queen when he was hired by the Rockwell family.)

In 1959 the Rockwells sold the Dairy Queen to Peter and Eileen Lekas. The Lekas were the proprietors for the next 29 years. In 1988 they sold the business to Peter's nephew John Petrou and his wife Anna.

John and Anna were thrilled to buy the business from their Uncle Peter even though it was a costly venture and they had two children, ages 12 and 14, to consider. The children helped with the business and a few years later another child was born. It became a real family affair. Anna remembers making a bed in the back room of the store for the baby to sleep in while the family worked to serve customers. In the early days they would open at noon and often stay open until after midnight. "As long as there was someone in line at the window, they stayed open to serve them", Anna said. They have always opened the Dairy Queen on March 1st and closed in mid October each year.

The Petrou's have been very active business people in our community. For years they have been involved with the Wayne Parks and Recreation Department in sponsoring sports teams as well as being

supporters of the Diamond of the Community Program. They have worked tirelessly in support of the Children's Miracle Network and raised funds for their facility at Children's Hospital. Last year they donated 1700 free ice cream cones as part of this fund raiser. Anna has been a part of Wayne's Downtown Development Authority as well as the Main Street Program. Many local clubs and organizations have come to the Petrous over the years seeking donations and sponsorships for their causes. The Petrous feel strongly about supporting the community they love so they always say Anna stated that it has been important to them to give back to the community that has given so much to them. "A little bit to help everyone who asks" is their motto she stated. They have also helped many young people in our community of Wayne by hiring teens to work at the Dairy

Queen. "We have had so many wonderful kids work for us over the years and sometimes we hire the children of our past workers. The people of Wayne are wonderful and have given us so much support. We appreciate their business as well as their friendship! "

Wayne appreciates the Petrou family for providing us with our favorite place to buy a Dairy Queen "sweet treat" on a beautiful spring, summer or fall day as well as giving back to the community in so many ways!

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# **Mobile libraries coming to Wayne and Westland**

The Wayne and Westland Rotary Clubs, along with help from the construction technology students at the William D. Ford Career Technical Center, are providing Little Free Libraries for the community.

Little Free Libraries is a "take a book, return a book" box full of books where neighbors can stop by and pick up a book or two and bring back another book to share.

It started in 2009 when Todd Bol of Hudson, Wisconsin, built a model of a one-room schoolhouse as a tribute to his mother, a former schoolteacher who loved reading. He put it in his front yard and filled it with books with a sign that said "Free books."

His neighbors and friends loved it so he built several more and gave them away.

As of January 2015, there are over 25,000 registered Little Free Libraries in all 50 states and over 70 countries.

Bryan Issacs, Josh Begarowicz and Chad Richardson, students in the Construction Technology class, built 10 handcrafted structures that look like small schoolhouses for the Wayne and Westland Rotary Clubs. They were built to withstand the weather and hold from 20-100 books. The Interact Club at Wayne Memorial High School painted and decorated the wood libraries. They will be filled with books by each club and distributed throughout Wayne and Westland.

In Wayne the five Little Free Libraries will be placed at Wayne Memorial High School, Starfish Family Services, Michigan Works! Wayne

Service Center, Roosevelt-McGrath Elementary School, and the Wayne Community Center.

Each little library will feature books for children, teens, young adults and adults. Rotary members will donate the books; the sites will then be responsible for maintaining the supply of books, said Wayne Rotary President Antoinette Wirth.

Community members can use the little libraries the same as they would a regular library- take a book, read it and then return it. But they can return a different book too.

Benefits of the Little Free Libraries are they don't require library cards and there aren't any late fees.

It is a great was to promote a sense of community, reading for children and literacy for adults.

The Rotary Clubs will fill the libraries with books. They chose this program for the educational and outreach opportunities in the local community. They will be stocked and set up before the end of the school year.
